Want to create white type?

Then you'll need to learn how to create a "reverse" using a word processing program. It's simple. Follow these steps:

Open a new document in Microsoft Word and follow these simple steps:

- 1 Go to the **View** menu, scroll to **Toolbars** submenu, and choose **Drawing**.
- 2 From the **Drawing** palette, click Text Box icon, and draw a text box.
- 3 Type in journaling or title.
- 4 Select the text box, and click **Fill Color** button on **Drawing** palette.
- 5 Choose a fill color.
- 6 Highlight text with cursor.
- 7 Click **Font Color** button on **Drawing** palette.
- 8 Choose white as your font color.

When you print this onto paper, the type won't print in the areas that appear white, allowing the color of your paper to show through. This is called a "reverse." Use white paper if you truly want your text to appear white. For the page in my album, I simply printed onto a piece of white cardstock, using my HP Photosmart 8750 Ink Jet photo printer.

You can create almost any color background to match whatever the color scheme is on your layout. You will find a predefined palette of colors in Microsoft Word, but you can also choose the More Fill Colors option for additional choices.

Once you get started, you won't stop! Try putting your type in reverse on your next layout. Just be warned: it eats up print toner at a much more rapid pace. But sometimes a new scrapping technique is worth the price, right?
